

Meet Your Neighborhood President: Joe Hanauer

Joe Hanauer (Antietam Lane) is an award-winning landscape architect, avid skier and 2-term president of Parkwood Hills. Here's a chance to learn what's in store during Joe's second term.

What are some of the neighborhood board's biggest accomplishments during your tenure?

Our biggest accomplishment as a board is maintaining the incredible atmosphere of our neighborhood. We start with an amazing number of volunteers throughout the course of the year in order to accomplish all we do. Let's start with the information we offer our residents -- I think it is rare to have a neighborhood like ours that publishes a quarterly newsletter and a directory every single year.

Even more impressive to me are all the activities we host, such as the Halloween Bonfire, Easter Egg Hunt, Santa Visits, Spring Fling and the July 4th Parade and Picnic. I truly believe when our kids grow up and move (maybe?) from Parkwood Hills, that they will remember these activities and want them in their own neighborhoods so that their children may enjoy these same traditions.

We have also undertaken some larger projects like raising money for the Owen Conservancy and revitalizing the Grand Canyon Road entry. We worked with our Alder and fellow Parkwood Hills resident Mark Clear to support funding to remodel the Fire Station in order to shorten emergency response times to our homes.

Additionally--and this is not a board function--we have residents who donate their own time and money to maintain the traffic circles in the streets. To me this is a testament of the residents of Parkwood Hills doing everything they can to keep this a great place to live.

What remains to be done?

We always need new volunteers for activities or to serve on the board. To do all I mentioned takes a lot of effort, each and every year. There are also many new things we can do. It would be great, for example, to strengthen our neighborhood ties to the Lussier Center. It would be

great to develop Everglade Park with playground equipment or other amenities. I would like to see stronger ties to Owen Conservancy. We also need to



keep an eye on the surrounding business districts and work with the city council and developers to maintain healthy, thriving businesses.

It's incredible that you've accomplished all this as a volunteer while managing your own business, Landscape Architecture, LLC. I hear you were recently nominated for an industry award - can you tell us about it?

Yes, I was a finalist for Landscaper of the Year presented by *Case Construction Equipment and Total Landscape Care Magazine*. The award recognizes the 12 best landscapers from across the country. The finalists are selected for their portfolios, business techniques, community involvement, safety records and for what sets them apart from others in the industry. I am extremely honored and humbled to have been included in the final 12.

Congratulations on your achievement. Do you ever find time for hobbies?

I do like to garden! I really enjoy working around the yard. I enjoy cooking and I love baking bread. We eat fresh bread in our house 4-5 times a week. I enjoy exercising, playing basketball with the guys at Parkcrest, biking and kayaking. My favorite activity though is downhill skiing. I love winter for the skiing!

Dahmen's Pizza Place: The "Cheers" of Parkwood Hills

ahmen's is known as the "Cheers" of Parkwood Hills, a place where everyone knows your name. In the '80s sitcom, regulars like Norm, Cliff, Sam and Diane came to hang out, enjoy a meal and cheer on their favorite team together.

The restaurant is located at the corner of Grand Canyon and Mineral Point Rd. and serves pizza, appetizers, sandwiches and salads. Names are indeed very important at Dahmen's, starting with the owners' last name. Brothers Tyler and Justin Dahmen opened the restaurant in 2010, when they were 25 and 23 years old. The two brothers are the only children of father Bruce Dahmen, principal at Memorial High School with a 40-year career there, and his wife Peggi, a secretary at Memorial High. You'll see other Dahmens and extended family members too. Cousins and even grandma work there.

Says Tyler, "My brother and I are here 60-70 hours a week and so it's good that we get along really well as close in age as we are."

The two always knew they would start their own business. "My dad was a business teacher," says Tyler. "So we always valued those skills and talked about what we liked about businesses and disliked about others and what kind we would want to run someday."

Originally, the Dahmen brothers checked out other spaces. "We looked at the space that's now Legend's but were a bit late getting in and also at the old TGIFriday on S. Gammon and we thought that was more of a corporate location and not a neighborhood fit." They had just started the permit process when Alder Mark Clear alerted them to an opening at Clock Tower Court. "We knew right away this was the one that would best fit our concept, a family-friendly restaurant and sports bar."

Their last name wasn't originally on the signage but they had the opportunity after six months to put their own nam on it. "We chose to make the family name a key part of the business. We grew up in nearby Wexford and know a lot of people in this area."

The restaurant has definitely lived up to its Cheers reputation. When the Parkcrest Pool Trivia Night fundraiser got rained out on Saturday, the next night, Dahmen's closed and hosted the rained out event on Sunday. "We didn't know if it would be 10 or 20 people but virtually everyone from the original event came over!"

Since its inception, the restaurant has hosted Crestwood and John Muir School fundraisers, sports event dinners, West Madison Little League events, club soccer, youth football and basketball events, state swim championship celebrations, Parkwood Hills volunteer thank you dinners book club gatherings and more.

There's no charge for the room but there is a minimum food order of \$150.

"And we have a new cake policy. If you have any leftover cake, you have to give it to Riley, our bar manager."

We are grateful to all the behind-the-scenes volunteers who make the Halloween Bonfire a success: Al Anderson's company, Kool View, donates the firewood and monitors the fire. And Acadia residents at 322 (Bobula), 326 (Cowles) and 330 (Hardin) donate water or electrical hook ups!

Special thanks to Allison Gunn and all her elves for coordinating visits by the special winter guest!
